1. Present and Past Positions

Associate Professor. Monterey Institute of International Studies. 2004 to Present. Teach and research in the areas of biodiversity protection, environmental conflict management, policy analysis, protected area policy, research methods, conservation leadership, business & biodiversity, environmental science, and other topics.

Received a Fulbright Grant from the U.S. Department of State to conduct research on innovative approaches for integrating economic development with biodiversity protection across southern Africa.

Program Head, International Environmental Policy. Monterey Institute of International Studies, Monterey, CA. July 2003 through June 2005 (2 years), followed by co-leadership duties July 2006 to June 2009 (3 years). Responsible for directing a master's degree program of 50-70 graduate students, including: recruiting, fundraising, strategic planning, managing existing partnerships, forging new institutional partnerships, providing cross-program coordination within the graduate school, designing and delivering the curriculum, providing program orientation to incoming students, engaging alumni, convening regular program meetings with students and faculty, evaluating the program, and other duties as assigned.
